School Review

All QLD state schools and undergo a review by the Department of Education at least once every four years. The reviews are conducted and supported by experienced school principals, trained and appointed by the School and Regional Reviews (SRR) branch.

The reviews play an important part in how the department supports school improvement. The provide schools with quality feedback, tailored to their context and needs. Principals use the review finding to work with their school community and school supervisor to develop actions to move the school forward.

What is PBL?

Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL) is an evidencebased whole school framework that actively promotes positive behaviour. It enables students to develop a clear understanding of required expectations, become responsible for their own behaviour and work together to create a positive, productive and harmonious learning community.

PBL is an evidence-based framework used to:

- analyse and improve student behaviour and learning outcomes.
- ensure that only evidence-based practices are used correctly by staff to support students.
- continually support staff members to maintain consistent school and classroom improvement practices.

Our staff take responsibility for:

- making sure their expectations are clear and aligned with Gargett SS expectations.
- providing supportive instruction about how to meet these expectations.
- consistently providing positive reinforcement for students meeting and exceeding expectations.
- striving to use behavioural incidents as opportunities to re-teach expectations.

The Australian Early Development Census Data Collection Term 2, 2024

Now in its sixth cycle, the 2024 AEDC Data Collection will occur across all Queensland primary schools in Term 2, between 1 May and 21 June. Each school's involvement in the AEDC helps to build a more complete picture of the health, wellbeing and development of children in the community. The AEDC data collected can help you and our teachers plan effective transitions to school with early childhood services, community collaborations, parent engagement in children's education and whole of school approaches to best support students and their families in the years before school.

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SAME DAY ABSENCE NOTIFICATION

The safety and wellbeing of students are the highest priorities for the Department of Education and Training and for the Queensland Government. New procedures have been updated to require same day notification for unexplained absences. From the start of this year, when a student is identified as missing from school, the school must notify the caregiver without delay either manually or electronically. This means that if your child is not at school before 9.30am without a reason the school must ring you to find out why. If you have notified the school because your child is away then no phone call will be made. Please remember to phone, text or email if your child will be away.

CURRICULUM LEARNING

What are we learning this term?

English: Examining persuasion in advertisements and product packaging In this unit students recognise and analyse characteristic ideas and persuasive techniques including language features and devices, audio effects and visual composition in advertisements and their impact on the target audience. Students use appropriate metalanguage to describe the effects of persuasive techniques used on a breakfast cereal package and report these to peers. Students use word processing software tools to manipulate text and images to create an effective composition for a breakfast cereal. They write and present a persuasive speech to promote their cereal

Math:Number and place value/patterns and algebra

Prep: Assessment task — Sorting collections, creating and continuing patterns

Year 1: Skip counting and counting patterns

Year 2: Investigating number sequences and identifying number patterns

Year 3: Patterning and connecting addition and subtraction

Year 5: Counting patterns and finding unknown quantities

Year 6: Identifying number properties and sequencing whole numbers, fractions and decimals

Using units of measurement- time

Prep: Explaining duration and event sequences

Prep-Year 2: To describe and represent the changes to a living thing in its life stages. To compare the life stages of two different living things.

Years 3-4: To understand how relationships of living things impact on their life cycle. To describe situations when science is used to understand the effect of actions, and organise and communicate findings.

Years 5-6: To develop an investigable question and design an investigation into simple cause-and-effect relationships including identifying variables to be changed and measured and potential safety risks. To collect, organise and interpret data to identify environmental factors that contribute to mould growth in bread and explain how scientific knowledge helps to solve problems.

Prep–Year 2: Students will investigate their personal history and identify and describe important dates and changes in their own lives.

Years 3–6: Students will investigate commemorations and celebrations that take place in their community and explore what aspects have changed and remained the same over time

Yr 3 Unit 2

In this unit, students will develop the fundamental movement skills of running, jumping and throwing. They will practise and refine these skills in individually based activities. Students will apply these skills in simple games and group challenges by refining movement concepts and strategies. They will also explore the benefits of physical activity to health and wellbeing.

'Athletic Spectacle'

(athletics)

In this unit students will create an athletic-themed sequence using fundamental movement skills and elements of movement. They will perform running, jumping and throwing sequences in authentic situations. **Technology with Mrs Mac**

• Computers: Handy helpers (Prep -Year 2) In this unit students will learn and apply Digital Technologies knowledge and skills through guided play and tasks integrated into other subject areas. They will:

recognise and explore how digital and information systems are used for particular purposes in daily life

- collect, explore and sort familiar data and use digital systems to present the data creatively to convey meaning
- describe and represent a sequence of steps and decisions (algorithms) to solve simple problems in non-digital and digital contexts
- develop foundational skills in systems and computational thinking, applying strategies such as exploring patterns, developing logical steps, and hiding unnecessary information when solving simple problems
- work independently and with others to create and organise ideas and information, and share these with known people in safe online environments

Design and Technology: Year 3

Repurpose it! In this unit, students will investigate the suitability of materials, systems, components, tools and equipment for specific purposes. They will repurpose a clothing item with other recycled materials to create a useful item
